Founded in 1864, Epworth is a multiservice agency that seeks to empower youth who have experienced trauma to realize their unique potential by meeting essential needs, cultivating resiliency, and building community. Thousands of youth and families turn to Epworth each year for a full range of services including: therapeutic foster care and case management: residential and intensive treatment: individual/family therapy and comprehensive psychological testing; emergency shelter and longer-term housing services; life skills and vocational training; as well as crisis care and outreach through the Drop-In Center, food pantry, and 24-hour crisis help-line.

#### **Mental Health**

We provide a range of services from psychological assessments and clinical diagnoses to home-based and virtual therapeutic care from qualified and devoted mental health professionals.

# **Foster Care Case Management**

Our programs help foster youth find permanent, loving homes, through reunification or adoption, and provide essential services to meet immediate needs and support a successful transition to adulthood.



# **Housing Services**

Our programs, from short-term shelter services to long-term transitional living programs, provide safe, stable housing to teenagers and young adults on their path to independence and selfsufficiency.

#### **Crisis and Outreach**

Our programs, including a 24/7 Helpline, street outreach, primary care clinic, and food pantry, provide at-risk youth and families with the help they need when they need it most.

Our programs are designed to extend beyond our walls, reach people where they need us most, and provide support in helping them move forward.

# Chante's Journey

# From Shy Beginnings to Independence

Chante's story highlights her resilience and the lifechanging impact of Epworth's Transitional Living Program (TLP), which provide young adults with the support they need to build stable, hopeful futures.

When Chante arrived at Epworth's Transitional Living Program, she was reserved and struggling with confidence. Today, thanks to her determination and the support of Epworth's team, she has grown into a young woman who navigates her life with independence and creativity.

Epworth's Transitional Living Program helps young adults facing housing insecurity by providing stable living arrangements, case management, and resources for personal growth. Participants commit to pursuing education or vocational training, maintaining employment, and developing life skills essential for independence.

"When I first met Chante, she was shy, but I quickly saw how smart, creative, and funny she is," says Lauren Lyons, career services coordinator. "Her smile is contagious, and she brings joy to every environment she's in."

## **Building Confidence and Independence**

Chante's journey began with small steps, like learning to complete everyday tasks independently. With Lauren's support, she built confidence and joined the Individual Development Account (IDA) program, which helped her purchase her first car.



"Driving off the lot was nerve-wracking—it was my first big purchase—but it felt amazing," Chante says. "Having a car gives me the freedom to go where I want, when I want, and it's been a big change for me."

Beyond practical skills, Chante's passion for art became a meaningful outlet. "When I do my art, I feel calm and relaxed," Chante says. Lauren encouraged her creativity, even suggesting she design a mural for Epworth. "She's incredibly talented, and it's amazing to see her use art to express herself and find peace," Lauren says.

Recently, Chante turned her artistic passion into a professional opportunity. Through Epworth's partnership with the "In the Door" program, she secured a job with a photography studio. "It's exciting to work with images and do something I love," Chante says.

#### **A Brighter Tomorrow**

Today, Chante balances two jobs—her new photography role and her position at Domino's—and has become an active part of her community. She has built friendships with her peers and enjoys exploring her interests, often during spontaneous outings with Lauren for food and boba.

"If I hadn't come to Epworth, I'd probably still be at my parents' house, doing the same old things—playing games, working, and not socializing. Working with Lauren has been amazing," she says. "Now, I'm living on my own, making friends, and moving forward with my life."

Lauren envisions a bright future for Chante. "She's smart, hardworking, and not afraid of challenges," Lauren says. "She deserves all the good things coming her way."

# Handle With Care Initiative Supports Youth with Dignity

When youth arrive at Epworth, their belongings often come packed in plastic bags—a common reality for those experiencing trauma and instability. Recognizing the importance of these items with care, Epworth launched the Handle With Care Initiative to ensure personal belongings are handled with respect.

This trauma-informed program provides each youth with a 50-gallon storage bin for larger items and a waterproof duffel bag for clothes and other essentials. These resources not only protect their possessions but also offer reassurance and a sense of stability during a critical time in their lives.

"Providing secure storage has made a difference," said Brittany Hamilton, Clinical Supervisor for Residential Services. "Youth feel safe knowing their things are protected, and they can focus on themselves instead of worrying about losing what little they have."

The Handle With Care Initiative goes beyond protecting belongings. It demonstrates to youth that they are valued and deserve dignity and respect.

# Stability and Support for Youth in Crisis

Epworth's Residential Services program has been a lifeline for youth in crisis, providing a safe and supportive environment to help them heal and thrive.

Located on a scenic 7-acre campus in Webster Groves, Epworth's Residential Services program has been helping youth ages 11 to 18 for more than 150 years.

The program provides a structured, trauma-informed environment for those facing emotional and behavioral challenges. A dedicated team-including youth advisors, licensed therapists, case managers, and nurses—works 24/7 to support each youth's social, emotional, and intellectual growth.

### **Individualized Care for Complex Needs**

"Epworth's Residential Services program is unique because it addresses a wide range of mental health challenges," says Becky Applebaum, Director of Shelter and Residential Services. "Every client receives individualized treatment because no single approach fits everyone."

Youth in the live-in program participate in weekly individual, group, and family therapy, along with case management and life skills training. Academic support is provided through enrollment in their current schools or the Webster Groves School District, ensuring educational continuity.



#### A Lifeline for Youth in Crisis

While referrals come primarily from the State of Missouri, Epworth also serves youth from other foster care systems and accepts private insurance and self-pay for at-risk youth in need. Youth typically stay an average of eight months; currently, the program is nearing capacity.

"Youth make great strides in our program and leave feeling supported," says Becky. "We actively seek their feedback and involve them in their treatment plans."

### The Need for More Support

Despite its significant impact, the Residential Services program is underfunded. Greater financial support is essential to maintain current offerings and expand critical services. Every donation ensures that youth in crisis receive the care, stability, and resources they need to heal and build hopeful futures.

# Together, We Can Change Their Future

- → Wellness Through Recreation: Provides access to gym equipment, team sports, bikes, arts and crafts, and other activities that promote physical and emotional well-being while building life skills.
- → Therapeutic Group Support: Funds essential supplies for group therapy sessions, creating opportunities for healing and connection.
- → Celebrating Milestones: Helps make birthdays, holidays, graduations, and other special occasions memorable for youth in care.
- → Creative Outlets: Supplies materials for arts and crafts, fostering creativity and stress relief.
- → Educational Success: Covers school supplies, yearbooks, field trips, and school pictures to ensure youth feel included and prepared.
- → Warm Winters: Provides winter coats and other essentials to keep youth warm and comfortable.
- → Clothing Basics: Supports kids who arrive with only the clothes they're wearing, ensuring access to everyday essentials like socks and underwear through a managed donation room.
- → Uninsured Medical Needs: Covers critical expenses like replacing broken glasses when Medicaid falls short.
- → Calming Trauma-Informed Spaces: Funds safe, therapeutic environments in dorms through sensory items, calming colors, and thoughtful design.
- → **Durable Furniture:** Replaces worn furniture in common areas, ensuring youth have comfortable and welcoming spaces to relax and connect.






